When it is working, almost everyone obediently awaits his turn. But, when the power is off, suddenly the same drivers become aggressive, impatient and selfish. It is only natural that without a fair and firm system in place, the law of the jungle takes over. Children in school are no different. By nature, they are good, but they need traffic lights. With clear rules, regular reminders, well-timed praise, and some calm explanation, almost every child will behave well and develop self-discipline. The friendly, sincere policeman with his whistle in hand is more than enough for most traffic situations. As parents and teachers, we do not need to use physical or verbal violence to raise and educate children. In fact, each time an adult beats a child or uses abusive language, we are teaching the child that people are wild beasts and that we live in a jungle. We are teaching the child that fear, pain, humiliation, and arbitrariness are acceptable parts of human interaction and the tools to inculcate discipline. Many parents and teachers The think that to maintain good discipline, children must be made to fear them. And **Guiding** that feeling of fear is developed in children by physical punishments and abusive language, such as taunts, sarcasm, and humiliation. Light Should fear be the foundation of discipline? What about the noble, dignified traffic light? Drivers do not stop at the traffic light because they fear it will slap them or because it might make fun of them in public. At most crossroads in Hyderabad, challans or fines are rarely issued. Rather, drivers stop because they understand the purpose of the light, respect the law, and trust the light is fair to all. Our school stands firmly against corporal punishment. As parents and teachers, we must understand how to build good discipline without using the tools of fear and pain. One of the most important elements of good discipline is having healthy human relationships relationships that are built on dignity, love, and hope. In E. R. Braithwaite's famous novel, To Sir, with Love, Ricky becomes a teacher in a slum area of London. The students are unmotivated and almost illiterate. When he focused only on teaching the syllabus, he found himself colliding with the students at every turn. Then he realized that he would have to first build a relationship with his class, which he did by addressing them as young adults ("Mr or Miss So and So") and taking their input about topics of study. He organized field visits and spoke to his students about life in general. He found that once he established this foundation, he was able to guide and teach the students—at times, even better than their parents. "Two by Ten" is a similar strategy documented by researchers Raymond Wlodkowski and Martha Allen. As an adult, imagine a child whose behaviour and attitude troubles you the most. Now, spend two minutes for ten straight days casually conversing with that child on topics that he or she initiates. The researchers found that there were remarkable improvements in the child's behaviour and attitude and that these improvements affected the entire class environment for the better. In both of these examples, adults are giving respect to the child as a dignified, reasonable human being. One with whom we can converse. One whose thoughts and feelings have value. One who can learn, grow and improve indefinitely. When we combine this attitude with clear, firm, consistent rules (remember the traffic light), we have most of the tools we need to help children develop selfdiscipline. Minhaj Arastu, Principal

Q What are your thoughts on the new educational reforms brought in by the education department?
